## Resident Spot Light

Who would have thought that when Terry Norman was born 50 years ago, that he would have such an impact on so many people's lives? Unfortunately, it took a disaster to have that impact.

He was born to Junior and Mary Norman in Auburn, WA, attended school there, spent some time in Iowa where his parents were born, and returned to the State of Washington. All was going well with this very friendly, charismatic, funny young man until the day before Mother's Day in 1984.

Terry and his friend were out for the evening and returning home. Terry was a passenger in the back seat of the car and his friend was driving. They were coming around a curve on the Green Valley Road when they missed the curve and hit a tree. Unfortunately, Terry was asleep in the back seat when his head hit the tree which broke his collar bone and left him with a traumatic brain injury. In an instant, his life changed.

He was brought to Harborview Trauma Center for treatment. After three months in a coma, Terry started to awaken to the new world he would come to know. He was just 18 years old and after several months in Good Samaritan Hospital and then a geriatric nursing home, his family was unhappy that this young man was spending his days in his room with 80 year olds. So, as most of you know, the family went on a ten year journey to raise funds and build a home for ten young adults who have all survived a traumatic brain injury. That home opened in Pacific in 1996 and in 2013, the second home was opened in Auburn for 12 more TBI survivors. Terry's Mother, Mary Norman, and founder of Terry Home passed away in 2014 and his Father passed away a few years before.

Terry is still that friendly, charismatic, funny (and flirting) young man even though he may move and speak slower than he did. But he is still the Terry we knew when he was younger. He still gets a twinkle in his eye when he is joking with you. His mind is still quick with comebacks that make you pause to figure out what he means. For example,


one day his Aunt Lois and Myla came into Terry Home for a visit. Terry's response was, "Looks like the ant farm got loose." On another occasion, Terry was eating his dinner which included peas. When someone asked why his peas were on the floor, Terry's response was, "I peed on the floor."

Terry spends his days listening to music, playing games on the computer and taking trips over to Fred Meyers to do a little shopping. He still loves cars and enjoys being at our Terry Home Show and Shine. And he enjoys having company – so please stop in to see him.

We thought that since Terry has turned this milestone age, that it was only fitting for us to put the spotlight on him and how the worst thing that happened to him turned out to be such a good thing for so many.

Thank you, Terry, for being you and making our day enjoyable.



## Donate Money:


